**OUR VISION:** Make post-secondary education dreams achievable for young adults who have been in government care.

### MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

For youth formerly in care aging into community and pursuing post-secondary education, the last two years have been a particularly challenging time. With schools moving online and many students lacking the necessary technology, coupled with the job losses that affected front line workers, many youth from care experienced significant isolation and stress. Without a family to return to or to support them financially as they work towards their dreams, these young people have also struggled with the impact on their mental wellbeing. Support from Youth Futures Education Fund, which provides for basic living expenses like rent, food, technology, counselling, and mental health support while students study, means former youth in care have been better able to cope.

In 2020-21, 519 students who had been in government or Designated Aboriginal Agency care and attended a post-secondary institution through a government or post-secondary tuition waiver program accessed support from Youth Futures Education Fund. This represents a 17% increase over the previous year. Thanks to our generous supporters, students have been able to access vital support.

Investments of \$250,000 each into the fund by the Province of British Columbia and United Way British Columbia – working with communities in BC's Interior, Lower Mainland and Central & Northern Vancouver Island, along with support from many other donors are helping ensure youth formerly in care not only have equal access to education but also the necessary assistance to be and do their best. This includes mental health support. Over 90% of students accessing the fund are continuing or have completed their educations – a testament to the courage, strength, and resiliency of youth formerly in care.

The fund, which was established collaboratively by Coast Capital, the Province of British Columbia, and the Office of the Representative of Children and Youth in 2014, is making a difference for youth aging into community and pursuing post-secondary studies. To date, we have supported over 1,700 students and distributed more than \$2.4 million in support. Our Advisory Committee, and partners the Vancouver Foundation and United Way British Columbia, are dedicated to helping more youth succeed, but there is more to do.

By donating, you are helping youth build a solid foundation to approach their education and their futures.







21-year-old Simranjit, Sim, has her sights set on a degree in Psychology. Thanks to her courage, high school guidance counsellors, and the Youth Futures Education Fund—a fund that helps with basic living expenses—Sim is on her way to success.

"Psychology sparked my interest because I have a great passion for learning and understanding why people think the way they do," Sim says. "It helps me understand myself better, having gone through a tremendous amount of trauma in my life."

#### Persistance pays off

Sim's road to post-secondary education has been a long one, including attending high school while living in her 2003 Honda Civic, alternative education, and finally completing her GED (High School Equivalency Certificate). Although Sim was not sure if she could afford it, she applied to Langara College and was accepted.

Sim completed her high school while on a BC Government Youth Agreement and was then able to move into an Adult Youth Agreement Program (AYA) to pursue her post-secondary studies, which helps cover the cost of things like housing, tuition and health care while attending school or job training. Sim says while the supplement helps cover rent there was not much left over to cover other necessities in a month.

"I was excited to learn of the Youth Futures Education Fund from the Langara Financial Aid advisor. Thanks to the fund, my world has shifted for the better."

#### A bright future

Sim is now in her second year at Langara College and plans to take several more semesters before transferring to University of British Columbia in pursuit of her Psychology or Behavioural Neuroscience degree.

"I am beyond grateful for being given a chance to pursue my education in full force without struggling financially to survive," Sim says.
